

The United Methodist Church, Clinton, CT Pastor M. Craig Fitzsimmons

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What a delight it was to accompany ten members of our Youth Group (and three other adults) to Youth 2011 at Purdue University in Indiana. I was getting a little worried the day before our departure since my flight from Detroit to Syracuse was cancelled (I was coming back from moving my daughter Martha out to Arizona). Fortunately I was able to get a late flight and arrived back in Clinton at 4:30 a.m. in plenty of time for our 7 a.m. departure! After an overnight stay in Ohio, we arrived at Purdue to check in and begin what was to be a fantastic four days with over 3500 United Methodist youth and adult leaders. This was one of two events scheduled, the second, two weeks later in Sacramento, CA. The theme for Youth 2011 was "More Than," such as this was more than worship, or more than a concert, or more than a gathering. It was a time to explore and deepen one's faith, to expand one's horizons and renew one's commitment to serving Christ.

Our youth fully participated in the activities which began early in the morning and went to around midnight. The days were packed full with small group LAB (one of which was led by Ally), Bible study, two workshops, worship, evening activities and group time. Meals were at the dorm which was seven-tenths of a mile away from the meeting halls but we didn't complain too much because we were in one of the few air-conditioned dorms! During the brief breaks we had the opportunity to wander through the exhibit halls and find out more about various ministries that were available for youth. Some even stopped by the college displays to learn more about some United Methodist Schools as well as loans and scholarships.

We met many people from around the country but were surprised that we were the only church represented from the New York Conference. We were also the only people from Connecticut. But one thing we learned was that we were not alone! We joined with thousands of other Christians in celebrating our call to discipleship as youth in the United Methodist Church. We were not the smallest or the largest group there but it did not matter, we felt that we belonged to one big fellowship in Christ.

Watching the group interact with one another and with other participants reminded me of just how special this group is. They are

accepting of each other, open to new people, caring, playful, thoughtful, spiritual and a real joy to be around. We will miss those who are going off to college but are looking forward to the contributions of the newest members. I am so grateful for the leadership of Jill and Carolyn Hale who made this all happen. Their continued commitment to providing a program and a space for our youth in our congregation makes a huge difference.

I hope we will have an opportunity to share personal reflections and some pictures from Youth 2011 with the congregation soon. I know you will enjoy it! Shalom,

This event takes place every four years and is sponsored by the United Methodist Board of Discipleship, Office of Young People's Ministries. The youth hope to have a supper and give a report of what they experienced. Needless to say, it was a great trip!

Church reopening - 1949

Palm Sunday, April 10, will mark the reopening of the sanctuary of the Clinton Methodist Church, after five months, during which time extensive redecoration has taken place. There will be both a morning and an evening service.

The morning service at 11 will include dedication of memorial gifts, baptism of infants and children, and reception of the 1949 Confirmation Class. The sermon will be by Bishop Lewis O. Hartman, LLD, of Boston and former editor of The Zion Herald, New England Methodist weekly and oldest church publication in America. Bishop Hartman will confirm the class and lay on hands in baptism.

The presentation of the committee of eleven in charge of the redecoration will be made by Evelyn T. Wright, chairman of the committee — Willard E. Bushy, R. H. Dolliver, Emily Herrmann, Charles B. Hull, Helen Hull, Seward Hull, R. L. Hutchinson, W. G. Jones, Charles Schneider and Bertram R. A. Smith.

The choir, under the direction of Seward F. Hull, with Elizabeth Whitman Walker as organist, will sing "The Palms" by Faure and "Prepare Ye the Way of the Lord" by Garrett. Choral responses have been written by the director, Mr. Hull. Organ music by Mrs. Walker will be "Open the Gates of the Temple" by Knapp, "Nazareth" by Gounod and "O Fairest Church of Christ" by Hans Sachs. Palms will be distributed at the close of the service.

The evening service at 8 will include two choral numbers by the choir augmented by members of the choirs of other churches of Clinton: "Unfold, Ye Portals!" by Gounod, from "The Redemption" and "Fling Wide the Gates" by Stainer, from "The Crucifixion". Organ music will be the Arioso "Dank Sei Dir, Herr" by Handel, "The Palms" by Faure, and "Finale" by Widor from the Fifth Organ Symphony.

The sermon will be by Rev. Dr. Robert H. Elliott, a resident of Clinton and Specialist in Religious Education with the Presbyterian Board of Foreign Missions. The other clergymen of Clinton will take part in the service and members and friends of other churches are especially invited.

The United Methodist Committee on Relief

In April and May, UMCOR made initial grants to <u>fourteen</u> annual conferences to help them deal with spring storms and flooding.

By June 7, UMCOR Hotline read, "Devastating spring floods have swept across the United States from Alaska to Mississippi to Vermont, causing damage to homes, crops and livestock. Major floods have resulted from high waters in the Mississippi River, Red River and Lake Champlain. Flooding continues in the Midwest.

"In the thirteen years I've worked in United States disaster response, there has never been a series of emergencies as widespread as what we're seeing this year." said the Rev. Tom Hazelwood.

When tornadoes struck Massachusetts on June 1, they hit nineteen cities, left three dead and dozens injured. The Monson-Glensdale UMC prepared more than 2,000 meals in the week after the storm. At Trinity UMC in neighboring Springfield, church members checked affected areas for those they could not reach by phone.

The May 22 tornado in Joplin, Missouri was one of the deadliest in U.S. history. With winds up to 200 mph, it injured more than 900 people and killed 153.

Between April 21 and 28, one super-storm left hundreds dead in Alabama, Tennessee, Mississippi, Georgia, Kentucky and Virginia.

Thank you for your generous contribution of \$104.00* to P.E.T. New York-East Jewett, Inc. and your ongoing support.

To date we have distributed PETs in Honduras, Afghanistan, Borneo, Guinea, Togo and Haiti as well as sent PETs to the Global Aid International Network in Pennsylvania.

Steve Canfield and I are planning our third trip to Benin in October. The PETs to be distributed are currently on a U.S. Navy ship courtesy of a program known as Operation Handshake. In addition we continue to send smaller shipments of PETs where they are needed.

We are presently working on converting an old dairy barn in good condition into "new" P.E.T. quarters while still maintaining current PET production levels. This will give us a large space where all operations are consolidated in one building as well as better access to main roads. We also hope to be able to recruit some new volunteers in the community.

Trustee update

The trustee summer has been very busy either working on 18 Commerce Street or directing contractors who worked there. Some work remains in the basement and a few things inside which will be handled by Dick Bell, who is the church liaison with the Almaawis.

A booklet with history and pictures of 18 Commerce Street has been prepared and may be seen in the Church Office.

Pastor Craig has built a video closet in the hall at the top of the ramp. It is locked, but arrangements may be made with the church office if you would like to use the equipment.

The location was formerly used by groups who meet here weekly. Now their items are all stored in the hall or closet next to the office. The only items of the church to be stored there are the sewing machine and card tables.

Now trustee attention can be focused on the Parsonage chimneys, cellar, etc.

Our gratitude is due the Board. It is not easy to maintain properties with buildings dated from 1845, 1855 and 1863.

St. Vincent de Paul, Middletown

Each autumn our Mission Committee rallies creative people, who join with other Clinton churches to make Ugly Quilts for the St. Vincent de Paul Community. Founded in 1980 as a ministry of the Diocese of Norwich by Sisters of Mercy Pat McKeon and Caroline Beaudoin, it is a place where people in need can find a meal, groceries, clothing, shelter and financial assistance.

The **Amazing Grace Food Pantry** on Stack Street distributes groceries to 800>< households each month — enough to make more than 200,000 meals a year.

Community Assistance serves families facing economic hardship and assists almost 400 households each year with rental assistance, security deposits, utility and fuel bills, clothing and more.

The **Soup Kitchen** located on Main Street, provides breakfast and lunch for up to 150 people

Supportive Housing, the fourth core ministry, manages Liberty Commons, a 40-unit apartment building next to the Soup Kitchen. It also provides subsidized apartments in the community and gives the intensive support necessary to help the homeless become successful in housing

A place where the churches are small, their parking lots full, but individual homes are suffering just as in the east with many farms abandoned and/or for sale.

Most of the hay and clover fields have been mowed and the corn is in varying heights depending on planting time and whether it is sweet or field corn. On the way to my family's reunion we passed through both Roy's and my hometowns in Connecticut's Western Reserve on the north coast of Ohio.

Our grandson took us in his car so we could enjoy the scenery. He wanted to see the Toledo Zoo and it was the first time we had been there since 1955, when it was a stop on our brief honeymoon. That might sound like an odd destination for a honeymoon but we were about to live in <u>Niagara Falls</u> for four years. The Toledo Zoo is very large and we managed to cover about ³/₄ of it before it was time to head to the campground in Somerset, Michigan.

It was hot so most of our time wa stayed in our air conditioned lodge, playing games, working on two jigsaw puzzles and sharing our lives since last we met. One young man is a chef in Wisconsin and brought cases of regional soda; another was on a three-week break from teaching in Japan and brought raisin cookies and sweet desserts from there. A teenager brought the family logo shaped in Rice Krispies.

It was the centennial year since the first Brichford Reunion and we were each given the group photo from 1911. The youngest child in the picture was my uncle, who recently died at age 102. He was proud of being the first college graduate (OSU) in the family and now nearly everyone has been to or is currently in colleges all over the country.

Twelve states were represented but those from Alabama, North Carolina, Utah and California did not make it this year. Somehow through the years, Roy and I have come to think of Connecticut as our home and it's nice to be back where we belong.

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
